RATIONALE:

The raiders came from across the sea. Who were they and why did they come? Who would stand against them and how would things change? Through this historical study we will devise historically valid questions about change, cause, similarity and difference, and significance. Our responses will consider thoughtful selection and organisation of relevant historical information from a range of sources.

History: Aims

To gain historical perspective by placing growing knowledge into different contexts.

To understand the connections between cultural, economic, military, political, religious and social history; and between short- and long-term timescales.

To know and understand the history of these islands as a coherent, chronological narrative,

Forces: Key Ideas

- Friction is a force against motion caused by two surfaces rubbing against each other
- Air and water resistance are forces against motion caused by objects having to move air and water out of the way.
- Some objects require large forces to make them move; gears, pulley and levers can reduce the force needed to make things move.

Changing Materials: Key Ideas

- All matter (including gases) has mass
- Sometimes mixed substances react to make a new substance. These changes are usually irreversible.
- Heating can sometimes cause materials to change permanently. When this happens, a new substance is made. These changes are not reversible.
